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(1) What is Erasmus+?

Erasmus+ is the EU's programme to support education, training, youth and sport in Europe.

The 2021-2027 programme has an estimated budget of €26.2 billion.

Key Action 1: Learning mobility of individuals

Erasmus+ offers the opportunity for higher education institutions to send students and staff abroad (in other programme countries or other partner countries) to study, teach, or train at participating institutions.







(1) What is Erasmus+?

GLS is participating in KA1 since 2018.

Our Project *Raising Awareness of Cultural Diversity* & *Improvement of Language Courses* is starting it's 3rd round this year.

By now, 67 staff members and teachers already participated in language and methodology courses in Europe.

Raising Awareness of Cultural Diversity & Improvement of Language Courses

We believe in life long learning and in the continuous broadening of professional expertise. Therefore, we train teachers from around the world and this is why we offer Erasmus+ courses for our teachers.

With the funding of Erasmus+ it is possible to allow our teachers and academic staff to participate in language, methodology and diversity courses around Europe.







With our current project we could support 55 teachers and staff members to participate in one week courses (language, methodology, diversity) in Europe.

For each participant GLS receives a set amount of support the EU provides – depending on different criteria like duration, country and distance, e.g. for a 5 day language course in Ireland:

Course fee 5 days	350,- €
Individual support (accomodation, provision)	882,- €
Travel costs (distance 500 – 1999 km)	275,- €







Additionally, GLS receives 350,- € organisational rate per participant.

With this money GLS is able to coordinate the project –

- having staff members apply for the funding,
- organise the project, support the teachers and staff members
- and finalise the project
- as well as disseminate the results.







Ellen, member of the academic team and teacher at GLS participated with funding of Erasmus+ and Bildungsurlaub in April 2019 in a one week workshop in Iceland: "Diverse Society – Diverse Classroom".

Cooperative Learning – one example

Please stand up and build two circles – one inner circle and one around.

Please try to find with your opposite partner things you both like to do – without speaking, just via pantomime.

You have one minute for finding similar interests. After this minute the persons in the outer circle switch to the next talking partner in the inner circle.







Cooperative Learning – one example

The aim is to create a relaxed class atmosphere because for cooperative learning to work, the participants need to know each other.

Our courses continuously improve with these exchanges and we gain insight in customer's wishes first hand.

We increase our participants' numbers – by gaining participants who are funded by Erasmus+ because we can offer these courses according to their needs.







Within this programme, everything is funded – costs for a language course, including travel, accommodation and provisioning.

Additionally, the applying institution (e.g. a language school) receives an organisational rate of 350,- € per participant.

It is a win for everyone, for education and for building networks.









(4) How to Apply

Language Schools can apply for different Key Actions focusing on learning mobilities or cooperation with other schools.

We decided to apply for Key Action 1, learning mobilities (KA1).

The application process is managed by the National Agency of the country where the applicant organisation is established.
